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Bellevue honors fallen Vietnam veterans

BELLEVUE — Nearly 100 people braved a windy and cold day March 28 to attend the National Vietnam War Veterans Day program at the Fallen Soldiers Memorial in Bellevue. The city has held a similar program since 2012.

Eleven local Vietnam veterans were honored with the placing of individual flags in the Fallen Soldiers Memorial: SP4 Roy C. Beasley (U.S. Army), PFC William R. Dumas (U.S. Marine Corps), PO3 Dennis H. Enderle (U.S. Navy), PFC Charles E. Frederick (Army), PFC Lamar D. Frederick (Army), Cpl. Jesse J. Garrard (Marines), PFC Thomas G. Idle (Marines), Lance Cpl. Kenneth R. Keefer (Marines), PFC Terrance J. Kudro (Army), PO3 Ronald L. Shaver (Navy, Marines), and Sgt. William J. Weidinger (Army).

The family of the late Jim Griffin, who lived in Bellevue for most of his life, was presented with a flag. Members

of the Marine Corps League raised the flag to half staff in his honor. Born in Willard, Griffin served with the Marines for three years and was in Vietnam for 18 months. Representing his family at the program were his wife Diana, son Mike, daughter Kelly, and his grandchildren, Drake Griffin, Gabby Griffin, Emily Mougey, and Kaylea Pertz.

The Grateful Threads made a Quilt of Honor, which was presented to Dennis Norman, who served in the Army for three years. In Vietnam from 1966 through 1967, he served with the 4th Battalion, 23d Infantry assigned to the 25th Infantry Division. Norman is a Bronze Star recipient and earned a Combat Infantry badge. In 2011, he retired from the Bellevue Police Department as a captain.

Blessing Basket Food Pantry assists veterans

A part-time driver for the Huron County Veteran Service Office, Wolfe helps distribute food. At first he delivered to nearly a dozen veterans; now he said that number has increased to 20.

The Blessing Basket Food Pantry has served nearly 1,270 area families so far in 2021. Pantry coordinator Vonda Patrick said a total of 4,189 people have received food through the end of March and of those individuals, 1,921 were adults who are 18 to 59 years old.

Started in October 2018, the Blessing Basket Food Pantry is based out of the Willard Church of God, 4551 Willard West Road. The pantry has a partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank of Lorain, Ohio, which is where the pantry buys its food.

"From October 2018 to October 2020, the Blessing Basket has served 4,226 families and 15,892 people. These numbers seem to rise every month," Patrick said.

Among the pantry volunteers are veterans. One of the regulars is Tom Hicks, who served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1971 through 1977. From 1978 through 1993, he was in the U.S. Army.

Veteran Joseph Levi Jr. also volunteers. He served in the Army from 1963 through 1965.

"(He) helps us in the pantry every time we serve the people," Patrick said. "He looks much younger than 80 and is also a great guy."

The Blessing Basket Food Pantry is open on the first and third Saturday of each month from 12 noon to 2 p.m. For the rest of the year, it will be open: June 5 and 19, July 3 and 17, Aug. 7 and 21,

Sept. 4 and 18, Oct. 2 and 16, Nov. 6 and 20, and Dec. 4 and 18.

A truck delivering the food comes to the pantry on the first and third Tuesday of each month. For the remainder of 2021, that schedule is: June 1 and 15, July 6 and 20, Aug. 3 and 17, Sept. 7 and 21, Oct. 5 and 19, Nov. 2 and 16, and Dec. 7 and 21.

Local Vietnam veteran tells his story

NORWALK — While serving in the U.S. Air Force, Bill Gainok was inside Air Force One very briefly.

He was at Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines for 18 months. Gainok worked in the customs and immigration department, where he checked passports and commercial and military aircraft that came from the United States. In 1968, Gainok said Air Force One, with President Lyndon Johnson, pulled into Clark Air Force Base "right in front of my office on the tarmac."

"They couldn't leave it on the tarmac in Thailand or Vietnam because it was too dangerous," he added. "I went out there to visit it and get the paperwork. They had to have it sprayed inside because of the rules in the Philippines to disinfect it."

Gainok talked to some of the noncommissioned officers who were guarding Air Force One.

"They said, 'Just go up there and get the paperwork.' So I walked up the stairs and I stepped inside the cabin." he said.

Gainok graduated from South Amherst High School and immediately entered the Air Force in the fall of 1966.

"I was in the security police. Originally it was called the air police," he said. "Now they use the word 'security forces." Being a security police officer was natural for Gainok since his father was a part-time sheriff's deputy and his grandfather was a police officer.

"My father was in World War II and he was in the Army Air Corps as a control tower operator," he said.

Gainok originally was stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base in Iosco County, Michigan.

"After I was there a couple months, they came around and (said) we're looking for people volunteering for either dog school or to be in something called safe side and you'll be trained (in) Army Ranger instruction. You'll probably go to a very hot spot," he said.



Figuring he would be there for a relatively short time, Gainok volunteered. He first went to England Air Force Base in Louisiana and then was shipped to Fort Campbell in Kentucky.

"That's where we had three months of very intense training with Army Rangers who were Air Force personnel," he said. "We didn't go paratrooping; that's the only thing we didn't do."

Gainok received training in counter-insurgency warfare and set up ambushes and patrols in the woods of Kentucky and Tennessee.

"I was in heavy weapons," he said. "I was an assistant gunner on a mortar."

In 1969, Gainok and his air wing went from Kentucky to Vietnam. He said their temporary duty assignment was to "train other troops in counter-insurgency warfare" who were already in Vietnam. He was there five months and two weeks.

"I was 21. I didn't really think that I was invincible," Gainok said, but he said he had to rethink things the first time he saw "the first rocket coming in" and hit the ground.

"You see the sparks fly and then you hear the concussion," he added.

When Gainok returned home from Vietnam, he said he "did't get any real negative things ... except on the news maybe." He remembered when he was attending the Firelands campus of Bowling Green State University, there were people who were "speaking out against the war."

"And to be honest, I was too. There were a lot of other veterans who were too. It wasn't quite right; something was wrong here," said Gainok, who has no problem telling anyone he served in Vietnam.
